
A FRIENDSHIP GOING FROM STRENGTH TO STRENGTH

And everyone is given the opportunity to express themselves in an open fun environment."




Festive Christmas Crafts

She said:" We are able to call on people to run workshops each year, some regulars,




some different. It is also nice to see friends meet each other in a completely different setting. It is a tremendous day for all."
